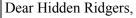

Speaking of construction, many homes are showing signs of wear now. We have seen some homes needing roofing work last season as well as walls replaced and other concrete work being done. As a community, we spent a considerable amount of time and money replacing the wooden retaining walls throughout as most of them were rotting. This year, one priority is refurbishing our lawns and bushes, reseeding our public areas, and increasing the upkeep of our community in general. All of this work takes time and we request your patience and indulgence as we go about beautifying Hidden Ridge. Remember, we will get to everyone's cul de sac, but we can't do them all at once!

Dining and Entertainment

Robbie's Recipes



This month we have three recipes to share with you. The first is my daughter Jennifer's Exceptional Bean Dip. The second comes from our own Frieda Jacubowicz, who makes the most delicious eggplant latkes. The third is my delicious Passover Spinach Pie for which I get great reviews! We hope you enjoy!

Robbie Schecter

Jennifer's Exceptional Bean Dip

2-10 1/2 oz. cans Fritos bean dip 1 C sour cream -8 oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened 1-1 1/4 oz. pkg. taco seasoning mix 20 drops Tabasco sauce 1 bunch green onions, chopped 1/2 lb. sharp cheddar cheese, grated 1/2 lb. Monterey jack cheese grated

Preheat oven to 350. With an electric mixer, combine all ingredients except cheddar and jack cheeses. Spoon into a greased shallow 2-quart casserole. Top with grated cheeses. At this point the dish may be refrigerated until party time. Bake uncovered for 15 minutes or until cheeses are melted. Wrap casserole in gaily colored napkins and serve with a basket of crisp tortilla chips.

Frieda's Eggplant Latkes

1 eggplant

tortilla chips

- 2 medium potatoes
- 2 T cornmeal
- 1 onion
- 2 cloves garlic
- 4-5 eggs beaten
- 1/2 C water
- 1 tsp. artificial sweetener
- 1 C flour (Frieda uses soy flour rather than wheat flour) pinch of pepper

Peel eggplant and soak in water for 1 hour. Grate the onion and eggplant on the large hole side of grater. Grate the garlic and potatoes on the small hole side. Mix with the eggs and water and combine with all other ingredients. This should create a loose batter. Fry in extra virgin olive oil.

Robbie's Passover Spinach Pie

- 6 T olive oil
- 2 pkgs. thawed, frozen chopped spinach
- 2 C chopped scallions
- 1 C matzo meal
- 1 C fresh dill, chopped
- 8 eggs
- 4 T lemon juice
- 2 whole matzos
- 1/2 3/4 C feta cheese

Grease sides & bottom of shallow 2 quart baking dish with 1 T oil. Heat remaining 5 T oil in heavy skillet. Add scallions, and after a few minutes, add the spinach. Stir until wilted and well combined with the oil. Stir in matzo meal and combine well. Add the dill. Remove pan from heat. Beat eggs with lemon juice until frothy, 4 - 5 minutes with electric mixer. Add spinach, salt & pepper to taste, and feta cheese. Break whole matzos and scatter pieces on bottom of greased pan. Pour spinach mixture into the pan. Bake at 350 for 35 - 45 minutes, until top is nicely browned.

The Treasurer's Report

When you consider the economy and other conditions we, as citizens of the United States must face, we are fortunate to announce that things at Hidden Ridge are stable. We are doing well. Your Board is working on our budget for the year ending April 30, 2010. I would appreciate your sending me, by email, any suggestions as to what expenditures we may reduce in order to keep maintenance fees in line. Our profit and loss statement for 9 months reflects \$1200.00 revenue over expenses as of February 28, 2009. We have built our total in all of our bank accounts, including reserves, to \$208,000.00.

We have had some problems collecting maintenance dues from some owners. The names of any homeowners owing their maintenance for more that 60 days have been turned over to our attorneys for collection (fees will be added to the outstanding billed amount). We will continue to procure a judgment and lien on each of these respective units. There is one unit that is in foreclosure and we are pursuing a judgment against the owner. This allows us to attach personal property as well as salaries.

Our auditors are in the process of finalizing the draft of our audit. They were delayed in this process because they did not receive the information in a timely manner from our accounting firm.

It is our intent to keep the community totally informed about these issues; nothing will be hidden. I wish you all a healthy end of the winter and hope that you are not overcome by daily events in this disastrous economic climate.

Spring Is Here! Renew! Re-Commit to Your Exercise Program!

Lack of exercise leading to weight gain in midlife is a well known and depressing fact of aging - your metabolism slows about 2% per year after the age of 40. If you eat the same and exercise the same as you always did, you will gain weight slowly and usually around the belly. This is a particularly difficult concept for those women and men who never struggled with "dieting" before but now, in midlife, find they are confronted with a changing "uncomfortable" body image. Believe it or not, research data has shown that in midlife, women and men doing 200 minutes of exercise a week will only maintain their weight (providing they do not exceed a calorie intake of 1500-3000 calories, depending upon height, etc.). At this stage of the game, they must exercise a minimum of 300 minutes per week in order to lose weight. Now you know why you can never loose those 5 - 10 extra stubborn pounds!!

So, you can see how important it is for you to continue and expand or renew or recommit to exercise. You would not leave your house without brushing your teeth. You should look at an exercise regime in the same way. It must be a part of your life in your winter home surroundings and certainly, in our beautiful outdoors summer atmosphere here in Hidden Ridge. For those of you who winter in a warmer climate, you have the advantage of that "outdoorsy" atmosphere all year round!

As I wrote all last year, there are multiple components that are equally important in an exercise routine cardio - (sweat) gets your heart pumping; strength - for your muscles and bones; and stretching. As we age, FAMS (flexibility, agility, mobility, and strength) training have so many benefits to our health - bone health, heart health, weight loss (or maintenance), which, in turn, will help prevent or treat high blood pressure or type 2 diabetes, joint health and a sense of overall well-being from looking good and feeling good.

Tomorrow is the first day of the rest of your life. Make a new commitment; keep a notebook if it helps, or get a buddy. Start slowly or knock your present workout up a notch. Choose walking, swimming, jogging, dancing, a sport, yoga, Pilates or any of the activities I have written about. Always check with your doctor first and get moving! Social Committee

The Social Committee has had its preliminary meeting to begin the process of planning for the 2009 season. A very significant issue was discussed both by the Social Committee and the Board, that is, money. This year we face economic hardship along with a longer season there are 10 weeks rather than 9 for which entertainment must be planned. One suggestion was to reduce the Saturday entertainment in half; however, the majority of the Board and the Social Committee rejected this idea outright.

So, how do we defray the additional costs on a budget that has not been increased, but rather, might be decreased and still maintain the high caliber of entertainment as we have had in the past? The virtually unanimous decision was to charge a nominal fee for entertainment rather than raise our maintenance dues. Homeowners will be able to purchase a book of tickets for all shows at a discount price. Or they will be able to pay for individual Saturdays. Guests will be charged just slightly more than homeowners for the price of an individual ticket. This process, while new to Hidden Ridge, is a familiar way of handling entertainment for many of you and certainly beats not having entertainment in our own clubhouse every week!

Here are some of the activities that are being planned for our enjoyment this summer: a sock hop, karaoke night, DJ and dancing , pizza night, continued card and game nights, Bingo, movie night, Saturday poolside cocktail hour with everyone bringing their own snack and drink, Sunday pot luck suppers. I, for one, am quite excited with the coming of summer and the activities planned - I can't wait to get to Hidden Ridge!

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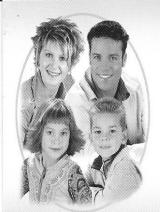
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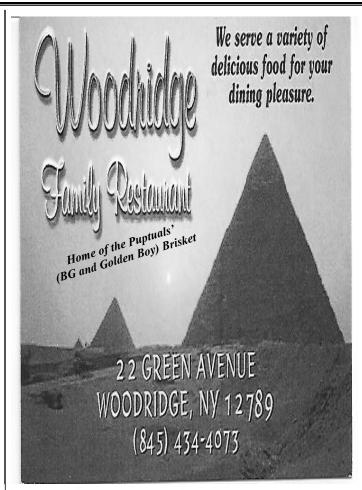
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Power and Force

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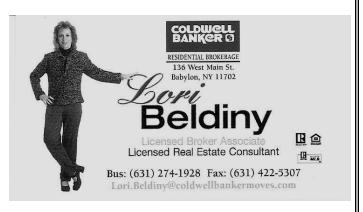
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
